Work is progressing on the fencing at the shelter. The addition of cross fencing makes it much easier for the dog volunteers. The new fencing allows us to choose the size and location of fields suited to the individual dogs' needs, makes it possible to give them longer exercise periods, and reduces the workload for the volunteers. Using caution and common sense, it is possible to let the dogs out both singly and/or in play groups. Taking into consideration safety factors such as the likelihood of fence fighting between dogs, who gets on with whom, the recall ability of the dog, etc. it is not necessary that the dogs be on leash in the North and South Fields during their exercise period.

Lake PAWS has once again appeared so it is important to avoid letting dogs in that area. After the Giardia problem last year we are trying to prevent it this year.

April is Volunteer Appreciation month so please let any volunteer you know that you appreciate them and the work they do for animals and humans.

A young Creston girl was bitten by a tick and contracted **Lyme Disease**. The shelter dogs have been treated with Bio-Spot. Volunteers may wish to treat their own dogs.

Cairn Terrier

The Cairn Terrier descends from small terriers of Scotland that were also ancestors of similar breeds like the West Highland White Terrier, Scottish Terrier and Skye Terrier. Cairns were bred to hunt otters, foxes, badgers and rats. Their name comes from the rock dens inhabited by badgers and foxes, called cairns which the dog would crawl into while hunting the animals. They were once called Short-Haired Skyes and later called Cairn Terriers of Skye. The name was shortened in 1912. The Cairn is perhaps best known for its role as Toto in the Wizard of Oz.

The Cairn Terrier weighs about 12 to 15 pounds and can be many colors: black, cream, gray, red, silver, wheaten and various brindle colors.

Health Issues: Some hereditary health problems can occur: Patellar Luxation, Cataracts, Canine Atopic Dermatitis and other skin issues and Legg-Calve-Perthes Disease.

This is a sturdy and active little dog with distinctive features. It has very short legs and a small but athletic build. Cairns are strong and alert, yet sensitive and affectionate. It has a thick, weather-resistant top coat and soft undercoat. He requires brushing every 2-3 days to avoid mats, but hair cuts are not always necessary. This breed sheds little if at all. Cairns are very alert and intelligent with plenty of energy. They are independent and sometimes headstrong dogs that require a solid foundation of obedience training and strict discipline.

Because of its high energy level, the Cairn Terrier should get plenty of regular exercise. Established daily exercise routine or enrollment in agility or similar activities would be ideal. The Cairn has an instinctive tendency to dig and may be vocal, but plenty of exercise can help prevent these behaviors.

The Cairn can make a wonderful pet for all kinds of households. This breed gets along especially well with children and can therefore be a wonderful family pet if properly trained and socialized.
